



2026 Road Bond Referendum Information

The City of Prospect Heights is placing a road bond referendum on the March 2026 ballot to address improvements to roadways, curbs, sidewalks, the Maple Road bridge, and the purchase of road maintenance equipment. The road bond request will be for \$21.5 million to be paid off in 20 years. A current pavement assessment study found that 26.1 miles of our local roads - about 65% of the City's network - require resurfacing or partial reconstruction by 2030. The City currently has a 2010 road bond that will expire at the end of 2026, and with many roadways having deteriorated significantly over the past 15 years, a new road bond is required to address serious resurfacing needs while the City continues ongoing maintenance such as crack sealing and spot repairs. If approved by voters, the proposed bond will allow improvements to occur with no increase to the current tax rate, as the new bond would continue the same rate already in place under the expiring debt. The City is sharing this information to ensure residents understand the condition of local infrastructure and the funding option under consideration, without advocating for or against the referendum

Roadway Improvement Plan and 2026 Road Bond Q&A

What will be the referendum question on the March 2026 ballot?

Shall bonds in the amount of \$21,500,000 be issued by the City of Prospect Heights, Cook County, Illinois, for the purpose of improving, reconstructing and resurfacing roads, improving and maintaining bridges, intersections, curbs and sidewalks and purchasing road maintenance vehicles and equipment, said bonds bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed 6.5%?

What size bond referendum is being considered, and for how long?

The City is considering placing a 20-year, \$21.5 million bond referendum on the March 2026 ballot.

What do you mean that there would be no net tax rate increase?

The City is currently paying off a road bond that expires December 31, 2026. The size of the tax rate for the new rate is the same size as the tax rate for the expiring rate. It is similar to paying off an old car loan and immediately buying a new car with the same payments. The new cost replaces the old cost.

The information states that only 86% of the road bond funds will go toward road resurfacing and reconstruction. What is the City planning on doing with the other 14%?

The City will take this opportunity to complete bridge maintenance on the Maple Road bridge, make sidewalk improvements along Willow Road and Burning Bush Lane, curb improvements at intersections, and purchase needed road maintenance vehicles and equipment. See the Pie Chart on Page 2.



Just the Facts on the Road Bond Referendum

- Only 3.5% of your property tax bill goes to Prospect Heights. As a non-home rule community, Prospect Heights can only levy a property tax for two reasons: 1) a supplement to fund Police pensions and 2) a road bond issued back in 2010. Both of these were passed by voter referendum.
- A typical \$450,000 home in Prospect Heights pays less than \$500 a year in property tax to the City of Prospect Heights. Check out your latest tax bill.
- In 2010, a road bond was passed by the residents because the City roads were becoming unsafe to drive due to severe deterioration and potholes. The 2010 Road Bond will expire December 31, 2026.
- With 15 years of wear and tear, the City's roads once again require repair and maintenance to ensure they remain safe and drivable so the City is asking the residents to approve the continuation of the use of road bonds to maintain the City's ongoing road maintenance program.
- With the paying off of the 2010 road bond at the end of 2026 and the January 1, 2027 implementation of a new road bond, the property tax rate imposed by the City will remain consistent.
- The 2027 road bond will provide for the repair of 64% of the City's roads (26 miles), improving and maintaining bridges, intersections, curbs and sidewalks and the purchase of road maintenance vehicles and equipment.

If the road bond is not approved, what could be the outcome?

- If the road bond is not approved, your individual property taxes will go down a few hundred dollars for the City of Prospect Heights portion of your tax bill.
- If the road bond is not approved, the City will not be able to maintain all the roads in a safe and drivable condition. Instead, the City will only be able to resurface and reconstruct a couple of the worst roads each year. This approach will leave the roads that only need routine maintenance and repairs to keep them safe, to deteriorate at an unacceptable rate and eventually fail. This will result in the need to completely rebuild the majority of roads at an exponentially higher cost.



The Prospect Heights Mayor and City Council have many important responsibilities to help keep the City of Prospect Heights a great place to live, work, and play. Perhaps the most important and impactful job of the City Council is to pass legislation. This legislation ranges from passing the annual budget to setting utility rates.

Prospect Heights Celebrates the 50th Anniversary of its Incorporation in 2026

On January 31, 1976, with the help of a change in state law and a successful referendum, the City of Prospect Heights officially came into being. Prospect Heights has come a long way since Hiram Kennicott settled the area in the 1830s on his 1,000-acre dairy farm. His home was located near what is now the intersection of Willow and Elmhurst Roads.

of unincorporated Prospect Heights voted by a two-to-one margin to incorporate, and the City of Prospect Heights officially came into existence on January 31, 1976. The monumental task of creating an operating city government then began, including the adoption of building codes, zoning regulations, city ordinances, and public safety services.

Shortly after incorporation, Prospect Heights entered into an agreement with Cook County to provide an enhanced police presence compared to what was typically offered in unincorporated areas. This arrangement proved costly and ultimately did not meet the service expectations of a newly formed city. In 1990, Prospect Heights took a major step forward by forming its own Police Department, followed by the construction of the Police Center in 1995.

Nearly one hundred years later, the first planned community homes were built by developers Carlton Smith and Allen Dawson. The very first of these homes was constructed at 8 N. Elmhurst Road—ironically, the same location that serves as City Hall today.

In 1938, the Prospect Heights Improvement Association (PHIA) was formed and acted as an unofficial governing body for this unincorporated portion of Cook County known as Prospect Heights. Carlton Smith and the PHIA established land-use restrictions for the community, and although Prospect Heights was not yet incorporated, Cook County required that all building permits be signed off on by Smith before approval. While incorporation was still decades away, other essential units of government were already being established within the community.

New residents often say they moved to Prospect Heights because of its large lots and semi-rural character. The City's incorporation in 1976 was driven largely by a desire to protect these features and prevent annexation by surrounding towns. Like many others, my wife and I grew up in Prospect Heights and chose to remain here to raise our family. It's hard for me to explain to someone exactly why Prospect Heights is such a unique and special place to live. I have heard people describe our town by explaining what we are not vs what we are. We are not a community of street lights at every corner or sidewalks on every street. We do not have a downtown with parking garages and 10+ story condo buildings. There are plenty of towns surrounding us that have all of that. Prospect Heights is a community, not a City of communities. Our large lots and countless trees let you know that you are in Prospect Heights. We are an island, surrounded by communities where it is easy to mistake which one you might be in.

What is now Prospect Heights School District 23 was formed in 1865, followed by the Prospect Heights Fire Protection District in 1944, the Prospect Heights Library District in 1957, the Prospect Heights Park District in 1966, and the Old Town Sanitary District in 1967. As the population grew, residents increasingly sought services that were typically provided by a city or village government.

So, what do the next 50 years have in store for Prospect Heights? I hope that we continue to value what has made this community special from the very beginning. As more time passes since incorporation, there is a real risk of losing the desire to preserve the semi-rural character that still defines Prospect Heights today. Protecting the semi-rural feel that residents have worked so hard to keep must always be part of the decision-making process for City issues.

In 1971, the first attempt to incorporate was challenged by neighboring communities. Ultimately, it took a change in state law allowing communities with 7,500 residents or more and an area of less than four square miles—which described Prospect Heights at the time—to incorporate without the approval of neighboring towns. With this new law in place, residents



Winter has arrived early this year, bringing snow and freezing temperatures. We lost power for nine hours on November 26th, the day before Thanksgiving, due to a strong windstorm. If you experience an outage, you can call Commonwealth Edison for updates on repair times. Happy Winter and Happy New Year!

2026 will be an exciting year as it is the City's 50th Anniversary Celebration and the Park Districts 60th Anniversary Celebration! There is planning for a Super Block Party in the summer, with

two great bands already booked, 7th Heaven and Hello Weekend. We are very excited for this great event.

Alderman approved placing a referendum question on the March 17, 2026 primary election ballot for a 20-year road bond. Approval from voters will allow the City to issue \$21.5 million in General Obligation bonds to repair 64% of city-maintained streets, or approximately 26 miles worth. This will not cost taxpayers any more than they are currently paying for the current bond which expires December 31, 2026 and will provide for a seamless transition into the new 20-year bond. The roads are again in need of repair and maintenance, and the city does not have the money otherwise to address all the road concerns. Street maintenance includes bridges, approximately 25 intersections, curbs and sidewalks, plus vehicle and equipment funding.

The City council approved Waterman sidewalk project is complete! This relatively small segment of sidewalk will have a big impact on our community as it provides a safe and convenient pedestrian thoroughfare for Prospect Heights students to Hersey High School.

Council recently approved an ordinance for special use permit for a sit-down restaurant at 1301 S. Wolf Road. (The Mongolian Center).

The Levee 37 wall repair and the sluice gate installation projects are moving forward with repair construction to be completed by the end of January and the sluice gate installation to be completed in late summer. The repair and sluice gate are the final pieces needed in the certification of Levee 37 that will provide relief to our eastside.

Council has approved an ordinance to allow the Natural Resource Committee to conduct prescribed controlled burns in the spring of 2026. This is an annual standard practice and is in the best interest of the City.

Council approved a resolution for an Agreement between the City of Prospect Heights and SB Friedman to provide developmental advisory services. This is the first step in the redevelopment of the City's eastside Milwaukee commercial corridor, hotels, and the Chicago Executive Airport property. SB Freidman will assess the commercial potential for redevelopment financing, forecast property, sales, hotels, and/or other tax revenues, and possible economic incentive agreements and/or redevelopment agreements.

Council also recently approved an intergovernmental agreement between the City of Prospect Heights and the Prospect Heights Park District regarding policing of Park Property. This is especially important now that the City implemented our eBike regulations and the Park District has imposed their own prohibition on the use of these devices within any of the Park's properties.




